The conversations and community sustain and support our students and then they are sent on their way renewed and blessed.

As the Building Bridges intern, I've felt the transformative impact of connecting my faith community with marginalized communities in need of love and attention.

Earlier this semester, LuMin collaborated with the Gender and Sexuality Center (GSC). The GSC was in need of clothes for students that have been disowned by their parents and in need of resources. My siblings at LuMin donated 156 articles of clothing; and in so doing, played a hugely significant role in the GSCs clothing drive.

I've also worked - patiently and gently - to connect LuMin to the University League Initiative to form an allyship with DACA recipients and undocument peoples alike. I'm beginning to see a beautiful connection between our two communities, but it's a delicate process. Building trust with this community is key.

I think the most amazing initiative I spearheaded this past semester has been LuMin's observance of the Transgender Day of Remembrance (observed on Sunday, November 17th - which was also our 2nd Sunday of Advent).

Our worship community designated the GSC's Trans Crisis Fund as our offering recipient that Sunday. Our students contributed \$631 toward this fund! I cannot overstate the impact this had on the GSC and the students who were present when I presented the check.

I'm so grateful for the opportunity to serve LuMin as an intern, to help our community to come together in service, to spread kindness and love, and to remember the great teachings of the Christ we follow.

I cherish getting to know my fellow marginalized students: interacting with them...seeing their smiling faces...witnessing their realization that they're loved and there is a space and community (LuMIn) for them when they need it most.

PUC Team India: My Faith in Action

My faith and major have led me to being a part of a wonderful program at UT called Projects with Underserved Communities (PUC). This program brings engineering and social work students together to develop solutions for communities in need, around the world.

I'm on "PUC Team India," and we're working towards building a community center for an ostracized small rural village in Southern India. Through this work, I see my mechanical engineering major intersect with Christ's call to love our neighbors – most especially those who are marginalized.

This center will provide the community with shelter, a place for medical treatment, an area for education, and a location for marriage ceremonies. Throughout this school year, we will be designing the building and fundraising for it. Next summer we will travel to India to help implement the building.
